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## **First Nations Engagement**



Why do Woodlot License Holders share information with First Nations and other potentially affected stakeholders?

- Requirement of the Ministry of Forests to support the approval of WMP's, WLP's, and CP/RP applications.
- Gather information that may be relevant to forestry management objectives within Woodlot Licenses.
- Build trusting relationships with First Nation communities and a variety of user groups.
- Demonstrate to First Nations and user groups that Woodlot
  License Holders are diligent land stewards.
- Create and maintain our Social License.



## **Challenges in the Chilliwack Natural Resource District**

#### NUMBERS

There are approximately 73 First Nations with asserted Traditional Territory in the District

#### CAPACITY

Many First Nations lack the resources/capacity to address the numerous Information Sharing Referrals received.

#### **LOCATION**

Many of the Woodlot Licenses in the District are located close to population centers/urban interface areas, which comes with increased scrutiny and management considerations.

#### ORGANIZATION

Some First Nations have formed 'collective' entities to represent their common interests providing a single point of communication.

#### COMMUNICATION

Many First Nations have identified dedicated lines of communication to departments or individuals to address Information Sharing Referrals.

### LOCATION

Many of the Woodlot Licenses in the District are located close to First Nation communities where past and present archaeological values and cultural uses are well documented and understood.



## The Process...

The objective is to share relevant information with First Nations, in an acceptable format, with the intention of receiving feedback that assists in forest management planning within a Woodlot License area.



## Limitations and Opportunities for Improvement

RELATONSHIP BUILDING Some of the more critical limitations in the Chilliwack Natural Resource District seem to be the capacity of First Nations to receive, evaluate, and respond to Information Sharing Referrals.

Efforts should be made by all Licensees to educate themselves and develop a better understanding of cultural heritage resource values and traditional uses of local First Nations.

#### GARIBALDIPARK

Licensees should be working to develop a repeatable, yet adaptive, process to prepare and provide clear and transparent Information Sharing Referral specifically tailored to First Nations.

Encourage and support First Nations in gaining a greater understanding of the challenges of small-scale forestry management while using these opportunities to build relationships.
